

The Vicars of St Mary de Haura, New Shoreham

since records began: the lists are incomplete for the early centuries

[Information largely derived from *'The Story of Shoreham'* by Henry Cheal, 1921]

Note: the *'Patron'* is the person or institution entitled to *'present'* (appoint) a new Vicar for Institution in a benefice by the Bishop. If the Patron does not do this within a prescribed period of time the patronage for that turn is said to *'lapse'* and the *'presentation'* is made by a higher authority. A *'benefice'* is the actual office or appointment held by a Vicar.
